Exeter Hospital is accredited by DNV Healthcare, Inc., and is a Magnet®-recognized hospital. Magnet designation from the American Nurses Credentialing Center is the most prestigious distinction a health care organization can receive for nursing excellence and high quality patient care.

Rockingham Visiting Nurse Association & Hospice is a community-based, home health and hospice agency providing individuals and families with the highest quality home care, hospice and community outreach programs within Rockingham and Strafford Counties.

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LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT, CEO

The mission of Exeter Health Resources and its affiliated organizations: Core Physicians, Exeter Hospital and Rockingham Visiting Nurse Association & Hospice, has always been to improve the health of the community members we serve. Throughout Fiscal Year 2017, our healthcare system advanced this commitment by developing the competencies necessary to broaden our accountability for the overall health of the population. Specifically, we worked to incorporate new analytical capabilities and systems necessary to better understand the breadth of our community members' health status, healthcare utilization, and importantly to better identify those individuals whose health is most at risk in the future. In today's world, being a healthcare leader requires us to reach beyond our system of care and redefine what it means to be a healthcare provider. As a result, Exeter Health Resources and its affiliated organizations have worked to identify the conditions in our communities that could adversely affect the health of its members and wherever possible, catalyze community partners to help to collectively support interventions that can contribute to improved community health.

The affiliates of Exeter Health Resources provided \$67,312,514 in charity care, subsidies and other community benefit programs and services to communities in the areas served during FY 2017. Of this, nearly one million dollars was contributed to our tax exempt community partners who provide vital services that are in alignment with our efforts to improve community health and well-being including access to healthy nutrition, transportation, youth suicide prevention, substance abuse and prevention, affordable housing and more. In addition to the ongoing collaboration with our community partners, our healthcare system continued its focus on providing innovative healthcare.

During FY 2017 Exeter Hospital began the planning that will introduce the state's newest and most advanced da Vinci® Surgical System, the latest innovation in precision robotically assisted surgery. The da Vinci technology enables surgeons to operate with minimal incisions, and the micro instrumentation has a greater range of motion than a human hand, enabling more precise movements to ensure the best possible patient outcomes. In addition, Core Physicians' surgeons Rebecca Kwait, MD and Kimberly Marble, MD became the first physician team in the state to become certified in Hidden Scar™ breast cancer surgery. This innovative technique enables the surgeons to have better access to tumors while minimizing scarring typically associated with breast cancer surgery. Exeter Hospital also introduced lung cancer screening using low dose computed tomography (LDCT). The hospital offers LDCT lung cancer screening for adults who have no lung cancer symptoms but who are identified as high risk due to specific criteria. LDCT is a CT scan that uses a low dose of radiation to detect lung nodules, with the goal of identifying early stage lung cancer when it is most treatable and has the highest success rate.

The future will call on Exeter Health Resources and its affiliated organizations: Exeter Hospital, Core Physicians and Rockingham VNA & Hospice to change, adapt and innovate. It will also call on us to recognize our unique role in uniting the community around improving its health. Our efforts in FY 2017 helped prepare us for answering that call.

Exeter Hospital and Core Physicians have formed clinical relationships with several leading medical organizations that enable us to provide advanced care close to home.

Massachusetts General Hospital Cancer Center: Leading Mass General radiation and medical oncologists and nurse practitioners provide care to patients at Exeter Hospital's Center for Cancer Care, along with multidisciplinary clinics, genetic counseling, clinical trials and nurse navigators.

Massachusetts General Hospital also provides telemedicine services to Exeter Hospital physicians to assist with the care of stroke patients at Exeter Hospital.

Brigham and Women's Hospital: Exeter Hospital has two affiliations with Brigham and Women's Hospital. The Center for Reproductive Care provides comprehensive infertility, reproductive endocrinology care and advanced reproductive surgery. Maternal Fetal Medicine provides expert care for women who have complications identified prior to or during pregnancy.

Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center: Our relationship with Children's Hospital at Dartmouth-Hitchcock (CHaD) brings **pediatric gastroenterology and pediatric cardiology services** to patients at our Exeter Core Pediatrics office.

Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center partners with Core Vascular Surgery to provide expanded vascular services in Exeter. Dartmouth also provides a medical director for Exeter Hospital's Center for Occupational Health.





Beacon Award for Excellence™ The American Association of Critical-Care Nurses (AACN) conferred a silver-level Beacon Award for Excellence on the Progressive Care Unit (PCU) at Exeter Hospital. The award recognizes unit caregivers who successfully improve patient outcomes and align practices with AACN's six Healthy Work Environment Standards. This is the second Beacon Award received by the PCU. Two years ago, Exeter Hospital's Intensive Care Unit (ICU) was also awarded a silver-level Beacon Award for Excellence. Exeter Hospital is currently the only hospital in New Hampshire to hold a Beacon Award.



Magnet® Exeter Hospital is a designated Magnet hospital, as conferred by the American Nurses Credentialing Center (ANCC) to recognize nursing excellence and innovation. This achievement places Exeter Hospital in the top 7% of hospitals nationwide.



Most Wired™ This was the tenth consecutive year that Exeter Health Resources has been named one of the nation's Most Wired health care organizations for its use of information technology.



NCQA Core Physicians and all of their local practices have received the NCQA Patient-Centered Medical Home (PCMH) Recognition for using evidence-based, patient-centered processes that focus on highly coordinated care and long-term, participative relationships.



Twenty physicians from Core Physicians' primary and specialty care practices were recognized among the best physicians in the state in New Hampshire Magazine's 2017 Top Doctors issue.

INNOVATION

Rebecca Kwait, MD and Kimberly Marble, MD became the first physician team in the state to become certified in Hidden Scar™. Dr. Kwait, a fellowship-trained breast surgeon, and Dr. Marble, a reconstructive and plastic surgeon, completed training in this advanced approach to breast cancer surgery that effectively treats cancer while optimizing cosmetic results.



Richard Feeney, DO of Core Physiatry has introduced spinal cord stimulation for nerve pain in the back and/or legs. After testing to ensure the treatment is effective for the individual patient, a small unit is implanted along the spine through a minimally-invasive procedure. The system provides ongoing stimulation for long-term pain relief.



Exeter Health Resources is committed to leveraging its Community Impact Program to substantially impact the risk of youth suicide in the greater Seacoast area of New Hampshire. Exeter Hospital awarded grants to local non-profits that provide services to address the risk factors associated with youth suicide, some of which include substance misuse, teen depression, social isolation, abuse, bullying and lack of awareness. In addition, Exeter Health Resources hosted the first Zero Suicide Academy in the state of New Hampshire. The Academy was a two day training with 90+ attendees from 13 different organizations.

E. William Johnson, MD, MPH is now providing a new treatment for enlarged prostate, a common condition in older men. The UroLift® system is a minimally invasive procedure that lifts the enlarged prostate tissue out of the way so it no longer blocks the urethra. This can eliminate the need for medications which can lose effectiveness over time or have side effects.



Exeter Hospital's physical therapists are now offering dry needling with appropriate patients to relieve pain. This procedure requires special certification, and is used in conjuction with other treatments. Two to eight thin filiform needles are used to stimulate trigger points, which are tight bands in the muscle that cause pain. These needles help relax the muscle, alleviating pain and increasing range of motion.



Exeter Hospital introduced lung cancer screening using low dose computed tomography (LDCT) for people who meet the high risk criteria. Lung cancer is the number one cause of cancer-related death, and is most treatable when it is identified in the earliest stages. Exeter Hospital offers LDCT lung cancer screening for adults who have no lung cancer symptoms but who are at high risk of lung cancer because of a heavy smoking history. LDCT is a CT scan that uses a low dose of radiation to detect lung nodules, some of which may be cancer. Lung cancer screening is not a single test, but a commitment to participate in a series of screenings over time.



Exeter Health Resources and its operating affiliates, Exeter Hospital, Core Physicians and Rockingham VNA & Hospice, are United in Wellness. This simple, but important, phrase embodies our health system's collective efforts to improve the health of the communities we serve.

As a not-for-profit health care system, the operating affiliates of Exeter Health Resources are supported in part by community members, grateful patients, and local business leaders, all of whom have been compelled to "give back" after their experience within our healthcare system. Whether it was the compassionate care provided to a loved one or, in some cases, inspired by their own personal experience, these individuals have helped to strengthen our collective efforts. This addendum includes an overview of *some* of the affiliates' many community benefit services and programs that help to address needs identified in the 2016 Community Health Needs Assessment.



GRATEFUL PATIENT STORY:

ANN KIMBALL

Ann had early stage breast cancer, which qualified her for Intraoperative Radiation Therapy (IORT), a one-day surgery and radiation treatment that eliminates 5-7 weeks of daily radiation. She was grateful to receive this specialty care close to home, as Exeter Hospital is one of the only facilities in the region to offer IORT.

ACCESS TO CARE

Financial Assistance

Exeter Hospital has three components to its health care access program:

- The Uninsured Care Discount/Hospital Access Plus Program

Patients who are uninsured will not be charged more than amounts generally billed to people who have insurance covering the same care. Exeter Hospital, prior to billing the patient, applies a discount towards gross charges for patients who are uninsured. This discount is not valid for patients who have health insurance coverage, including but not limited to: Medicare, Medicaid, MedPay, third party liability, or any other state or federal programs.

- The Financial Assistance Program (FAP)

Exeter Hospital's community-based Financial Assistance Program is available to uninsured and under-insured patients who meet income and asset guidelines, and who live in our service area. To qualify, patients must first have applied for all other sources of coverage, including through the Healthcare Exchange and the New Hampshire Health Protection Program.

- Catastrophic Care Discount

Exeter Hospital's Catastrophic Care Program provides financial relief for those patients who do not qualify for the Financial Assistance Program, but who are faced with a substantial debt due to a serious illness or injury. This program is calculated based on a percentage of the patient's gross income.

The operating affiliates actively promote these programs through direct patient education, paid advertising and community partnerships.

Exeter Hospital provided \$993,124 (calculated at cost) in charity care which served 978 people.

Core Physicians offers a financial assistance program for patients who meet certain geographic and financial criteria. Core Physicians provided \$180,495 (calculated at cost) in charity care which served 488 people.

Rockingham VNA & Hospice provided \$6,247 (calculated at cost) in charity care which served six people.

Telehealth Services: Exeter Hospital provided \$338,009 in Telehealth monitoring services serving 10,226 people.

COMMUNITY PARTNERS

The operating affiliates of Exeter Health Resources work collaboratively with numerous community agencies towards meeting the needs of the community. These relationships include but are not limited to:

Lamprey Health Care

Exeter Hospital continued its financial support of Lamprey Health Care with a community benefit grant in the amount of \$380,500.

Lamprey Health Care provides high quality primary medical care and health related services, with an emphasis on prevention and lifestyle management, to all individuals regardless of ability to pay. As New Hampshire's oldest community health care center it provides services at three centers located in Newmarket, Raymond and Nashua.

Families First Health and Support Center

Exeter Hospital made financial contributions to Families First in the amount of \$51,000.

Families First is a community health center offering a wide variety of health services and programs including primary care, prenatal care, dental care and mobile health care for the homeless.

Connor's Climb

Exeter Hospital provided support in the amount of \$17,000 to Connor's Climb.

The Connor's Climb Foundation is dedicated to preventing youth suicide. The nonprofit organization raises funds locally to support suicide prevention and education programs in New Hampshire. All of the funds raised directly impact programs for suicide awareness, education and prevention in the New Hamspire community.

Seacoast Mental Health Center

Exeter Hospital helped to underwrite mental health services in the amount of \$463,482 serving 541 people.

Exeter Hospital partners with Seacoast Mental Health to offer mental health services to patients and their caregivers in the Emergency Department and the Center for Cancer Care.

Governor Chris Sununu came to Exeter Hospital in September to proclaim September 10-16, 2017 as New Hampshire Suicide Prevention Week. Along with Exeter Hospital, attendees included state leaders working on suicide prevention in New Hampshire.

In February 2017, Exeter Hospital announced the naming of its Interventional Cardiovascular Lab in honor of Thomas P. Wharton, Jr., MD of Core Cardiology, a pioneer in the treatment of myocardial infarction, commonly known as a heart attack, with emergency balloon angioplasty and stenting. In recognition of Dr. Wharton's leadership and to acknowledge the tremendous impact he has made on Exeter Hospital and the communities served, the Board of Trustees together with the leadership of Exeter Hospital formally named the "Thomas P. Wharton, Jr. Cardiovascular Suite."

Kevin Callahan, president and CEO of Exeter Health Resources stated, "For many years Dr. Wharton has led Exeter Hospital's outstanding cardiovascular interventional team – a team that has been responsible for saving the lives of countless members of our community. His constant reminder that time is critical has resulted in Exeter Hospital being recognized nationally for its work with the entire 'chain of survival' to respond quickly, from paramedics in the field all the way to the cath lab for acute coronary angioplasty. Dr. Wharton has been a consistent advocate for – and proponent of – community hospital-based interventional cardiac programs, thereby significantly advancing standards of cardiac care nationally. His work has not only saved hundreds of lives locally, but countless lives across the country."

The Hospital also established The Wharton Fund, which will help to support Dr. Wharton's commitment to the prevention of heart disease along with the continued provision of advanced interventional cardiac services within the local community. Donations can be made at unitedinwellness.org.

COMMUNITY BENEFIT PROGRAMS &

New Heights

Exeter Hospital continued its support of New Heights in the amount of \$50,000.

New Heights partnered with Chase Home for Children and Seacoast Outright to form the Seacoast Youth Suicide Prevention Network. The organizations will cross train and provide a portion of their core services to 150 youth within the first year.

Transportation

Exeter Hospital provided 241 transports at a cost of \$26,522.

Exeter Hospital's transportation program is an important health care support service provided in response to an identified community need. Each year the program enhances access for hundreds of patients who otherwise would not be able to obtain needed health care and health related support services.

HAVEN

Exeter Hospital provided support in the amount of \$40,000 to HAVEN in alignment with its suicide prevention efforts.

HAVEN is dedicated to addressing public health through violence prevention and improving the well-being of children and families. Preventing abuse and providing support for those impacted by domestic and sexual violence can lead to healthier and more secure children and adults.

Community Health Services

The operating affiliates of Exeter Health Resources continue to provide various support programs and services to improve the health and wellness of the community. These include but are not limited to:

Community Education Programs: Exeter Hospital provided community education services at an expense of \$500,189.

Cancer Wellness and Diabetes Support Programs: Exeter Hospital served 704 people in its cancer and diabetes programs at \$1,110,161.

Community Based Clinical Services: Rockingham VNA & Hospice contributed \$54,290 towards serving 689 people with community based clinical services.

PROFESSIONAL **EDUCATION & RESEARCH**

Health Education

Through the Health Education Program, students in various stages of their academic careers benefit from the experience of working with professional clinical staff. Agreements with Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical School and the University of New England among others, allow medical students to pursue internships through various Core Physicians' practices. We have been fortunate to partner with Seacoast School of Technology allowing high school juniors and seniors to explore future health career options available to them. Additionally, this year over 180 students in nursing and allied health related careers from over 30 educational facilities were given the opportunity to work alongside the excellent clinical staff of Exeter Hospital, Core Physicians and Rockingham VNA & Hospice.

188 students participated in training and internship programs provided by the affiliates of Exeter Health Resources at a total cost value of \$1,106,501.

Research

The Center for Cancer Care at Exeter Hospital participates in several national research groups sponsored by the National Cancer Institute, which enables the Center to offer clinical trials to patients undergoing treatment at Exeter Hospital. These offerings allow patients to voluntarily take part in leading edge research that does not necessitate travel outside of the Seacoast area.

Exeter Hospital provided \$374,440 for clinical trials and research that served 782 patients.

Financial Summary

Exeter Health Resources reported consolidated gross revenues and other support of \$730.3 million which is a \$40.4 million or a 5.9% increase over the prior fiscal year. Gross revenue generated by Exeter Hospital increased \$37.1 million or 6.9%. This favorable revenue growth can be attributed to an increase in both volume and charges for services. Gross revenue generated by Core Physicians increased \$2.8 million or 2.1% due mainly to a \$2.2 million increase in testing/laboratory service revenue, while other revenue sources were consistent or decreased slightly. Gross revenue generated by Rockingham VNA increased \$.5 million or 3.1% predominately due to a \$.6 million increase in home care services.

While consolidated gross revenues and other support increased 5.9% from fiscal 2016 to fiscal 2017, total deductions from revenue including bad debt increased \$26.6 million or 7.1% as a result of various fixed rate payer contracts and bad debt expense.

Consolidated operating expenses increased by \$23.7 million or 7.8% over 2016 levels which were consistent with the growth experienced in 2017. The two leading factors were an increase in salary and employee benefits of \$14.7 million or 8.4% and supplies and other expenses of \$7.6 million or 7.5% from fiscal 2016.

The organization provided approximately \$67.3 million of community benefit in fiscal 2017, which included \$11.3 million to subsidize health services, offer community service programs, provide charity care and provide direct cash contributions to other community agencies that support the mission of the organization. The other \$56.0 million represented the cost of Medicare and Medicaid services provided to patients that exceeded reimbursement received from those programs.

Exeter Health Resources' operating margin in fiscal 2017 was \$.2 million. This was a decrease of \$9.9 million from the prior year as increases in net revenue were lower than the increases in expenses. The investment market continued to be favorable in fiscal 2017, which resulted in a total non-operating gain of \$18.9 million versus a \$5.4 million gain in fiscal 2016. Investment returns and the swap value appreciation were the two biggest contributors accounting for \$9.0 million and \$4.8 million, respectively.

The organization continued its capital investment commitment by purchasing \$11.1 million in property, plant and equipment in 2017 which included new and replacement medical equipment along with building and information technology infrastructure.

The overall liquidity remained strong in fiscal 2017 as the organization's day's cash on hand was 250 days which represented a 3 day decrease over 2016. Total cash, short term investments and investments increased approximately \$18.4 million in 2017 to \$214 million which was principally related to unrealized equity gains recorded during the year. The long term debt to equity ratio improved from 21.4% in 2016 to 18.2% in 2017 as no new debt was incurred while net assets continued to appreciate principally due to a significant increase in non-operating income.

Exeter Hospital's Baa2 bond rating was reaffirmed with a stable outlook from Moody's Investors Service.
